### **A1.4.1 APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING**

As discussed in the previous section, the hairstylist apprenticeship program consists of in-school learning and on-the-job practical training. As noted, there are several pathways to completion; traditional apprenticeship or the community college or private career college pathway.

As an apprentice, you learn the hairstylist trade on the job. You work with and learn from experienced and professional hairstylists. The Apprenticeship Training Standard Log Book (<u>Hairstylist – 332A</u>) identifies all the skills associated with the hairstylist trade in Ontario. It was developed in consultation with representatives from industry. The log book, acting as a training standard, is written in statements that describe how you, the apprentice, must perform each skill in order to be considered competent in that skill. The Apprentice and Sponsor use the log book as an official record of training. The Trainer and Apprentice are required to sign off and date each skill after the Apprentice has proven competence in these skills. The completion of this document is necessary to complete your apprenticeship and receive your Certificate of Apprenticeship.

You also learn in a classroom from instructors who know the trade. This may take place on a college campus or in a designated training center.



# **A1.4.2 IN-SCHOOL TRAINING**

Depending on the training delivery agency, in-school training may be available in one of the following ways:

Block release (full-time, for a set number of weeks)

Day release (one day per week from September to June)

Part-time (night-school programs)

Alternative delivery (online, correspondence, etc.):

The in-school curriculum has been developed to provide this theoretical knowledge and to offer some practical applications to complement the on-the-job work experiences of Hairstylist apprentices. The objectives of the curriculum, therefore, are to provide a basis for:

Sound theory training to meet the challenges presented in the trade.

Reinforcement of fundamental skills of the trade through the exposure to practical applications

The curriculum has been presented in chronological sequence. However, the actual application of the sequence may differ in each training provider.

#### Community Colleges and Private Career Colleges Pathways (1500 hours)

As an alternative pathway, private career colleges and community colleges offer 1500-hour hairstylist programs that consist of theoretical and practical training delivered in a classroom setting. After completing these programs, graduates must register as apprentices and train on the job until they meet the requirements for certification. A typical in-school program provides students with 1,500 hours of hairstyling education: 510 hours of hairstyling theory and 990 hours of practice in hair cutting, styling, colouring and lightening, permanent waving, chemical relaxing and hair additions and trends.
